Dear friends,

I often hear people use the term 'the institutional Church' as a way of describing the Church and their association or lack of association with it. The term is generally used in a negative sense to describe a cold, out of touch, rule obsessed and distant Church. The reality is that there is only one Church. Part of that reality is that the Church needs to be organized and structured to function faithfully to the mission of Jesus Christ. A more authentic understanding of the Church can be drawn through our study of scripture and Tradition. At the centre of the Church is Christ, who draws us into his love and friendship. The Church can be described as a gathering of people. This concept finds its origins in the very meaning of the work ekklesia, the Greek word the New Testament used for the coming together of the community. Cardinal Avery Dulles identified six ways or models to describe and understand the Church's character: Institution, Mystical, Communion, Sacrament, Herald, Servant and in a later addition to the book, as Community of Disciples.

The early Church theologian, Hippolytus, uses this wonderful metaphor to describe the Church "the place where the Spirit flourishes'. Flowing from the Holy Spirit I have always experienced the Church in terms of deep friendship and pilgrimage. The image of a pilgrim Church can be helpful in renewing our church life. The church as a place where bonds of friendship exist beyond blood are grounded in the words of Jesus himself: "Greater love has no man than to lay down his life for his friends," (Jn 15:13). St Allred takes these words seriously and adds "see how far love between friends should extend; namely, that they be willing to die for one another. This comparison can be read as a parallel to the Pauline counsel that husbands should love their wives "as Christ loved His Church," with all the forgiveness and self sacrifice that line implies (Eph 5:25)

St Paul speaks of the church as the Body of Christ (1 Cor. 12:27), or as a living temple (1 Cor 3-6).

As we begin this new year I hope through our different ministries and initiatives we can explore, promote and live a deeper understanding and love of the Church.



Scripture Reflection

Matthew continues the Sermon on the Mount with a three part instruction by Jesus on the Way of Life in the kingdom of heaven. Today's reading is part one and deals with the Law. Part two deals with worship and religious practice and contains the Lord's Prayer. Part three deals with trusting God and deeds of loving service to our neighbor.

When Matthew speaks of "the Law and the prophets" he means the whole Scripture. When the Messiah brings the fullness of the kingdom none of scripture will be done away with. Instead it will be fulfilled. Matthew's Jesus does not overturn the Law of Moses, nor does he set his followers free from the Law. He requires his followers to go beyond the Law by doing more than the Law requires.

The Law condemned murder. Jesus condemns anger. The Law condemned adultery. Jesus condemns even lustful looks. As Jewish Christians who had always been faithful to the Law Matthew's community need a way to understand the difference Jesus and the kingdom he brings have made. They affirmed that God had always been at work in history through "the Law and the prophets." But God's work goes beyond that to be embodied by the Messiah who reveals the definitive will of God. The written scriptures and their interpretation in tradition are surpassed by Jesus whose life and teaching are the definitive revelation of the will of God.


A visit from Fr Josh

Understanding Holy Week: A four evening historical study of Jesus' final days before His Passion

Jesus did very curious things during Holy Week. He cursed a fig tree, rode on a donkey, turned over tables in the Temple, and deliberately went into a place of great danger. Why? All these details are meant communicate very particular things to us. But without certain historical facts, we can miss out on the deeper meaning!

Non-violence works

Why Civil Resistance Works - The Strategic Logic of Non-violent Conflict. Erica Chenoweth & Maria J Stephan, Columbia University Press, New York, 2011. Reviewed by Frank Vavasour.

otice the title is not 'How civil resistance works', but 'Why' it works. In a researched comparison of violent and non-violent campaigns, Chenoweth and Stephan show that non-violent campaigns are more successful (63%) than violent ones and although some violent ones are successful (25%) almost all break down into further conflict within 5-10 years. In contrast successful non-violent campaigns, generally change to, or lead to more stable governance.


While many campaigns are analysed and discussed in the book, there are four detailed case studies:

- The Philippines' ousting of President Marcos is a particularly good account.
- A non-violent campaign in Iran succeeded too, though in an exception to the rule, led to less democracy because a group of radical clerics came to power bringing their repressive theocracy which killed 20,000 in the post-revolutionary period.
- The first Intifada between Palestine-Israel was a winning, rated 'partial success', which unfortunately broke down into factionalism after Abu Jihad, Arafat's deputy of the PLO and by far the most popular leader, was

- assassinated by Israeli commandos. In 1988 there were more than 30 different organisations active in Israel to protest Israel's violent repression of the uprising.
- 4. In Burma the reliance on only one leader, Aung San Suu Kyi, weakened resistance planning so that students and ethnic groups took to armed struggle, and the government regime was able to divide them through treaties.

There follows interesting data about the effects of oppositional violence and suppression inside a nation and international influence. The authors draw on evidence that non-violence, "continues to be effective, regardless of how powerful the opponent State is." The strength of the internal opposition or external factors have an influence, but are not insurmountable to success. Those who claim that their use of violence is "a last resort" really have not tried it. It is instructive for policy makers to note too, that a violent regime's repression reduces its chances of success by 35%.

The authors provide reasons for and analysis of many campaigns that don't succeed. However, when there are plenty and varied types of resistance, mass mobilisation, adaptability, sustained pressure, multiple levers in action, a



dislodgement of a regime from its political, economic, social and even domestic military pillars of support, then nonviolent campaigns are unstoppable.

There is a ten-page Table of the outcome of 100 non-violent and over 200 violent campaigns in the appendix (available online: Erica Chenoweth's website).

A section on the primacy of participation in street demonstrations is included as is a section on role of the Catholic Church and grassroots organising which was crucial in the Philippines. While Cardinal Jamie Sin is commended, overall people-power triumphed, with the church being an important channel. The church's stance also drew people away from the violent New People's Army struggle.
