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Dear friends,

This is Fr Josh's final weekend with us before he heads to World Youth Day on Wednesday and then to his new appointment as Administrator of the Parish of Berala. On behalf of everyone, I thank Fr Josh for his ministry among us. May the Lord continue to guide him.

With Fr Josh's departure, there will not be Mass on Thursday morning as I have another Mass elsewhere. I am unsure if there will be another assistant priest, but I have assured the Archbishop I am ok and that I have a fantastic team and parishioners who support me and the vision of the parish.

I love todays Gospel about the sower and the seed. It captures how Jesus as our window into understand God is superabundant in his love and mercy. The sower is not strategic about where he sows the seed, rather he just throws out the seed, hoping some of it will land in fertile ground. As ambassadors of the Gospel, called to be witnesses of faith through baptism, all we need to remember is to keep offering the seed of God to others. We can't allow stress or discouragement or disappointment to get in the way of being generous. Often we withhold the seed of the Gospel because we think the way someone lives their life is not worthy of the Seed of God. Who are we to judge? Let us be inspired by St John Chrysostom who wrote about the motivation of the sower:

How can it be rational, as the gospel says, to sow seed among thorns, on rocky ground or on the path? With regard to seed and soil it would not be rational. But with regard to souls and teachings it is very much to be praised. For a farmer would be rightly blamed for doing such a thing since it is impossible for rock to become soil, or for a path not to be a path or for the thorns not to be thorns. But with rational beings it is not so. It is possible for rock to change and become fertile soil, and for a path no longer to be frequented or be accessible to any passerby but become rich arable land and for thorns to be cleared and the seed to have ample space to grow. For if it had not been possible, this sower would not have sown his seed. If a change did not occur in everyone, that was not the fault of the sower; it was the fault of those who did not wish to change. He did what belonged to his part. If they abandoned what they received from him, he who showed such love for humankind is not to blame.

Scripture Reflection

Today's Gospel marks the beginning of the third long discourse given by Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew. Over the next few weeks, the Gospel readings will consist of the entire 13th Chapter of Matthew's Gospel, a lengthy teaching discourse.

Throughout this discourse, Jesus will offer several parables to illustrate for his listeners what he means by the kingdom of heaven. He begins with the parable of the sower, which appears rather straightforward—of course seeds grow best in good soil. Seeds that miss the soil, are sown on rocky ground, or are sown among other plants will not grow. The surprise in the parable is the enormous yield of the seed that is sown on good soil.

Jesus then explains his use of parables. Jesus seems to suggest that he uses parables to teach because the meanings of parables are not self-evident. The hearer must engage in some degree of reflection in order to comprehend the message of a parable. In this way, the medium—the parable—models the point of the parable of the sower. Those who are willing to engage themselves in the effort to understand will be rewarded by the discovery of the message and will bear fruit.

To bring home the point, Jesus interprets the parable of the sower to his disciples. The different types of soil in which the seeds are sown are metaphors for the disposition with which each individual hears the teaching about the kingdom of heaven. Some will be easily swayed away from the kingdom of heaven. Some will receive it for a time but will lose it when faced with difficulties. Some will hear the word but will then permit other cares to choke it out. Yet some will receive it well, and the seed will produce abundant fruit.

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The Mission of the Church

Part 2: Caring for the Poor

Last week we looked at the first aspect of the mission of the Church: to love and worship God. This week, let's look at our mission to care for the poor.

Mother Theresa worked with some of the poorest people on earth. When she accepted the Nobel Prize in 1987 she said this:"[Jesus] said that at the hour of death we are going to be judged on what we have been to the poor, to the hungry, naked, the homeless. And [Jesus] makes himself that hungry one, that naked one, that homeless one, not only hungry for bread, but hungry for love, not only naked for a piece of cloth, but naked of that human dignity, not only homeless for a room to live, but homeless for that being forgotten, being unloved, uncared, being nobody to nobody, having forgotten what is

human love, what is human touch, what is to be loved by somebody, and he says: 'Whatever you did to the least of these my brethren, you did it to me'."

The Church teaches us about the Works of Mercy we should perform to respond to many kinds of poverty.

- Feed the hungry
- Give drink to the thirsty
- Clothe the naked
- Give shelter to travellers
- Visit the sick
- Visit the imprisoned
- Bury the dead
- Instruct the ignorant
- Counsel the doubtful
- Admonish the sinners
- Bear patiently those who wrong us
- Forgive offenses
- Comfort the afflicted
- Pray for the living and the dead

Have you been in need of these works of mercy? Have you seen others in need?

Caring for the poor cannot be separated from the love of God. When we live life closely with God, he changes how we look at other people (even people we do not like):

"I learn to look on this other person not simply with my eyes and my feelings, but from the perspective of Jesus Christ. His friend is my friend. Going beyond exterior appearances, I perceive in others an interior desire for a sign of love, of concern... Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave." (Pope Benedict, God is Love, 18)

Servant of God, Dorothy Day, spoke about her deep sense of needing to be fed in order to go out to others:

"I was saddened last week when a former nun told me she was tired of going to Mass daily. She had been doing that for fourteen years, and no longer felt it necessary. So much routine... One could only point out that breathing was routine, and eating was routine, and many a time we had no appetite, food even seemed disgusting to us. We go eat of this fruit of the tree of life because Jesus told us to. ... He took upon himself our humanity that we might share in his divinity. We are nourished by his flesh that we may grow to be other Christs. I believe this literally, just as I believe the child is nourished by the milk from his mother's breast."

Jesus, let us see each person we encounter as your friend. Help us to be sensitive to all their needs. Help us to see how we can be a friend to each person.

Feast of Our Lady of Mt Carmel

This Sunday we celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Mt Carmel, one of our parish patrons.

The site of Mt Carmel was part of a grant known as the Mt Lachlan Estate, and in 1858 it was in the passion of Sir Daniel Cooper who gave it as a gift for the site of a Catholic Church. On top of the hill Archbishop Polding dedicated the church after another church on a hill Mt Carmel in Palestine. Our Marian connection can be summed up in this letter by Fr Fr. Míceál O'Neill, O. Carm, Prior General of the Carmelites:

"Our Marian tradition has in roots in the dedication to Mary of the first oratory built by the hermits in the midst of their cells, close to Elijah's spring, in one of the peaceful valleys on Mt Carmel. This meant that they were acknowledging her, the Mother of their Lord, as the Lady of the Place. Both oratory and spring, on that mountain in the Holy Land, continue to remind us that our forebears chose to live in allegiance to Jesus Christ, under the loving gaze of Mary and in imitation of her and of the prophet Elijah, whose solemnity we also celebrate in July. Our forebears were among the many medieval pilgrims who flocked to the Holy Land. Like other pilgrims, they chose to remain there, and eventually sought to form an eremitic community on the slopes of Mt Carmel. Together they lead a life of penance, that is, of ongoing conversion, that they might «live in allegiance to Jesus Christ and serve him from a pure heart and a good conscience» (Rule, 2). The notion of allegiance as conceived and lived out in the Middle Ages, meant that these hermit-brothers of Carmel would have developed a living bond with the Holy Land that was then considered to constitute the actual patrimony and kingdom of their Lord. They committed themselves to remain in this land, in their hermitage, engaged in a spiritual battle (Rule, 18-19) in the service of their Lord."

Just like Mt Carmel in Palestine, so too Mt Carmel in Waterloo has been and continues to be a place of contemplation, community and service. As we renew our devotion to Mary, we honour her again as the Lady of the Place and place the people of the Holy Land under her motherly care in the confidence that the more fervently we show our desire for peace, that peace that only our God can give, then the surer we are that our prayer will be heard, and there will be peace.



In the year 1251, in the town of Aylesford in Our Lady England, appeared to St. Simon Stock, a Carmelite. She handed him a brown woolen scapular and said, "This shall be a privilege you and Carmelites, that anyone dying in this habit shall not suffer eternal fire." In time, the Church extended this magnificent privilege to all the laity

who are willing to be invested in the Brown Scapular of the Carmelites and who perpetually wear it.

As Our Lord taught us to say the Our Father, Our Blessed Mother taught us the value of the scapular. When we use it as a prayer, Our Lady draws us to the Sacred Heart of Her Divine Son. It is good, therefore, to hold the scapular in the hand. A prayer offered while holding the Scapular is as perfect as a prayer can be. It is especially in time of temptation that we need the powerful intercession of God's Mother. The evil spirit is utterly powerless when the wearer of a scapular faces temptation, calling upon the Holy Virgin in this silent devotion.

To be eligible for the scapular promise, one must be enrolled in the Brown Scapular Confraternity. This is a simple ceremony which can be performed by any priest.

I think that what we suffer in this life can never be compared to the glory, as yet unrevealed, which is waiting for us. The whole creation is eagerly waiting for God to reveal his sons. It was not for any fault on the part of creation that it was made unable to attain its purpose, it was made so by God; but creation still retains the hope of being freed, like us, from its slavery to decadence, to enjoy the same freedom and glory as the children of God. From the beginning till now the entire creation, as we know, has been groaning in one great act of giving birth; and not only creation, but all of us who possess the first-fruits of the Spirit, we too groan inwardly as we wait for our bodies to be set free.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus left the house and sat by the lakeside, but such crowds gathered round him that he got into a boat and sat there. The people all stood on the beach, and he told them many things in parables.

He said, 'Imagine a sower going out to sow. As he sowed, some seeds fell on the edge of the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Others fell on patches of rock where they found little soil and sprang up straight away, because there was no depth of earth; but as soon as the sun came up they were scorched and, not having any roots, they withered away. Others fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Others fell on rich soil and produced their crop, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Listen, anyone who has ears!'

Scatter that seed!

The teaching of the parable of the sower is as true for us today as it was in its original context. The word of the kingdom continues to fall on people who are at various stages of readiness to receive it. What Jesus suggests to his disciples – and to us – is that the 'good soil' can't always be predicted. Jesus doesn't tell his disciples to only sow the word in people who are receptive. Rather, he wants them – and us – to scatter the word everywhere and to rejoice when it does find good soil and yields a rich harvest.
