In todays Gospel after what seems a rather cold start to the conversation Jesus shows great hospitality to the woman who asks Him to heal her daughter. He praises her in the end for her great faith. If we take this Gospel and so many others we could form an argument that Christians are to look on others as a potential neighbour. Our experience of living in the City of Sydney is the experience of living in a 'City of Villages'. In our part of Sydney there are the villages of Rosebery, Zetland, Green Square, Waterloo, Alexandria, Beaconsfield, and Redfern. Surely a characteristic of living in a village is neighborliness where we try to care and support one another, where we offer something of ourselves to those where we live. Jesus invites us as Church to be a neighbour to those around us. What does the Church offer when it shows up to the neighbourhood? Our neighbours have the right to ask what we bring! One of the most important gifts the Church brings to the neighbourhood is hospitality where differences are not hidden but made public to be shared to create a greater unity. The Church works to make visible the gifts of Christ thereby transforming the neighbourhood. Cardinal Francis George once said, in the Church "every racial and cultural difference must be made public so that everyone may come to know how Christ can be black, or white or brown [or whatever colour]. Differences must always be made public in a way that they are shared so that they can enrich everyone. The Church must create a neighbourhood where everyone is at home". We learn from Jesus that justice is not an equality that suppresses differences. Justice is right relationship in God. Right relationship delights in differences and helps us share them. Can we do this more effectively here?

Thank you to those who participated in the carpark survey last weekend. 90% of respondents said they were happy to continue having Mass on Sunday at Rosebery. This means parking will only be available on the street. I am told that the builder can most probably leave the disabled spot for me to park. I need this spot as I often transport things from my car. The tentative date to start the project is Monday 18 September. The Vicar General (on behalf of the Archbishop who is away) approved the expenditure for the project and Sydney Catholic Early Learning is also contributing to the project.



Review of the 'Hallow' Prayer App

Some of you may have heard of a relatively new Catholic prayer app called 'Hallow'. I have been trialling this app over the past few months to see whether I would recommend it to you. Here is what I found.

What's on the app?

The app has a wide range of audio resources including:

- courses such as 'A Biblical Walk Through the Mass' with Dr Edward Sri, or 'Spiritual Exercises' with Fr Timothy Gallgher
- audio books such as 'Searching for Peace' and 'Presence of God'
- series on mental health such as 'Stress and Anxiety', 'Healthy Habits', 'The Science of Happiness'. Also series on grief, addiction, recovery, and infertility.
- novenas, rosaries, guided meditations, and other devotions lead by people such as Mark Wahlberg, Jonathan Roumie (from The Chosen), Dr Scott Hahn and Leah Darrow.
- Catholic music and chant including Catholic LoFi
- Bible in a Year and Catechism in a Year with Fr Mike Schmitz
- resources for kids such as bedtime prayers, stories, and sacramental preparation

What's good about it?

It contains a large volume of high quality and varied resources. Having an audio track lead you through prayer, meditation and courses can be really helpful and practical: for example, it can introduce you to new forms of prayer and learning, and you can use it on your commute.

Any downsides?

If you prefer visual formats to audio formats, then this app might not be for you. All of the resources I have found to date are in audio format. That said, they are done very well.

What does it cost?

There is a free version of the app with only limited content. The paid version of the app with all the content costs about \$14 per month/ \$90 per year. There is a 14-day trial period of the paid subscription so you can give it a road test and see if you like it.

The Verdict

Over the past 9 months we have worked together to restart our hospitality ministry. Thanks be to God, there are now 30-40 hospitality volunteers in our parish.

Hospitality is a very important ministry for Christians. Jesus called his disciples his friends, and he ate and drank with them often. Our morning teas are a wonderful time to give real friendship and fellowship to each other, and also welcome others. You never know how you may brighten someone's life by your presence, someone who really needs it.

Despite having a great team, we can still use your help! Many hands make light work so the more we have involved, the easier and more smoothly it runs. You don't have to be able to cook to do this ministry. You can:

- Help set up
- Serve tea and coffee
- Invite individual Mass-goers to our catch ups and show them the way to the venue
- Serve food
- Be an intentional host, who looks out for new people or people who are on their own, to make sure they feel welcome by chatting with them or introducing them to others
- Help clean-up and pack-up
- For those who love to cook or buy food, we absolutely need your contribution too. You can sign up once or as many times as you like to bring food.
- Help to make or bring gluten free foods for those with gluten intolerances and allergies.
- Donate food which will not spoil such as long-life milk, children's juice boxes, or cakes/biscuits with long expiration dates.

Frequently asked questions

How often do I have to volunteer?

It's up to you. We have a roster. We just ask that you commit to a date so we know we have your help that day.

Can I change dates if something comes up?

Absolutely. Someone on the roster will swap months with you.

Do I have to go on the roster?


No, but it is more helpful because then we know what help we have. It also ensures we have enough food and, conversely, that we don't waste food by having too much.

Gospel Refection

Today we move ahead in our reading of Matthew's Gospel. Last week we read about Jesus walking on the water and the disciples' confession of faith that Jesus is the Son of God. If we were reading Matthew's entire Gospel, we would have read about Jesus' debate with the Pharisees about Jewish purity laws. Jesus argues that it is not what goes into us that makes us unclean; he is referring to the strict Jewish dietary rules. Instead our words and our actions—what comes out of us—make us unclean because they emerge from a heart that is unclean.

Knowing about Jesus' debate with the Pharisees helps us to understand today's Gospel. In fact the story heightens the surprise and shock we feel as we hear Jesus' exchange with the Canaanite woman. The woman, who is not Jewish, approaches Jesus, requesting that he heal her demon-possessed daughter. At first Jesus ignores her; he says nothing. The disciples ask Jesus to send her away, and Jesus agrees, remarking that he was sent to minister to the Jews alone.

The woman persists, paying homage to Jesus, and yet Jesus denies her request again. He even insults her, using a Iewish word of derision for Gentiles, "dog." But the woman cleverly turns Jesus' insult into an affirmation of faith. Only then does Jesus grant her request and heal her daughter.


Jesus' unresponsiveness to this woman may strike us as uncharacteristic or shocking. Yet in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus' ministry is directed primarily to the people of Israel. At only a very few points, such as the one found in today's Gospel, do we find Jesus anticipating the later Christian ministry to the rest of the world.

Behind Matthew's text we can hear this early Christian community's struggle to understand how God's selection of Israel is consistent with two events: Israel's rejection of Jesus and the Gentiles' acceptance of Jesus. Just as Jesus was surprised by the faith expressed by the Canaanite woman, so too the first Christians were surprised that the Gentiles would receive the salvation God offered through Christ. In today's second reading from Paul's letter to the Romans, we hear the apostle Paul considering this same concern.

The faith that the Canaanite woman expresses is an affirmation of and confidence in God's abundant mercy. Yes, salvation comes through Israel, but it overflows for the benefit of all.

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus left Gennesaret and withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. Then out came a Canaanite woman from that district and started shouting, 'Sir, Son of David, take pity on me. My daughter is tormented by a devil.' But he answered her not a word. And his disciples went and pleaded with him. 'Give her what she wants,' they said 'because she is shouting after us.' He said in reply, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel.' But the woman had come up and was kneeling at his feet. 'Lord,' she said 'help me.' He replied, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the house-dogs.' She retorted, 'Ah ves, sir; but even house-dogs can eat the scraps that fall from their master's table.' Then Jesus answered her, Woman, you have great faith. Let your wish be granted.' And from that moment her daughter was well again.

Historical Context

When Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt, the 'Promised Land' they sought was the land of Canaan (approximately the area of modern Israel, TransJordan, Syria and Lebanon). Here they were commanded to utterly destroy the Canaanites and to subdue the land. (Exodus 23:23-24) The Israelites never successfully removed all the Canaanites from the Palestine region. By the time of Jesus, the Israelites had established themselves in the region between Judea in the south and Galilee in the north, while the original inhabitants of the area had been 'squeezed out' predominantly to the north. The Canaanites were dispossessed of their land by the Israelites and it is easy to see why there was tension between them.
