

Dear Friends,

Until recently, most of us would have only associated Halloween with a particularly violent series of American movies of dubious (and varying) quality. It's surprising, then, to realise that the origins of Halloween are profoundly religious and very Catholic at that. In the Catholic Church, 1 November is commemorated as the Feast of All Saints (All Hallows). The Eve of All Saints (i.e. the night before) is known as "Halloween." In the Catholic Church, the Feasts of All Saints and All Souls (which we commemorate on 2 November) herald for us the beginning of the end of the liturgical year (which concludes with the Feast of Christ the King). During the month of November, the readings in Catholic liturgies turn their attention to "the last things" in anticipation of the time that God's Kingdom is finally realised at the end of time. November is also a time when Catholics are encouraged to remember those who have died and gone to their eternal rest.

This year, again, I have been amazed how, like the Christian feasts of Christmas and Easter, retailers have seized upon yet another opportunity to suck the meaning out of a significant Christian feast and replace it with something completely meaningless (and possibly Satanic in some cases) in order to make money. What, then, should we do? I think, for most children and young people, the celebration of Halloween is fairly harmless (although I do have real concerns about children without an adult guardian fronting up to houses and people they do not know - there really might be a monster lurking within!) It would be a great shame, though, if we did not seize upon Halloween as an opportunity to reclaim something of the very Catholic meaning of the feast itself. Throughout November, then, we should all remember the call of the Second Vatican Council that "it is a holy and a wholesome thing to pray for the dead." During November, why not take the opportunity to remember a loved one who is no longer with us and say a prayer giving thanks for their life? Here is a prayer that St Ignatius of Loyola wrote that (I think) still speaks to us today:

Receive, Lord, in tranquility and peace,
the soul of N.
who has departed this present life
to be with You.
Give him/her the life
That knows no age,
the good things that do not pass away;
through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen

A final thought – we live in a society that hides much of the reality of death. I've noticed recently on radio that people no longer "pass away." Apparently, these days, they just "pass" (almost as though death is some kind of test!) Without being morbid about it, November can be a time to remind ourselves of one of the great doctrines of our faith – the Communion of Saints. As Catholics, we really do believe that, as our funeral liturgy reminds us, "life is changed – not ended." There is great beauty and peace in that reality for all of us! God bless,

Gospel Reflection

This week's Gospel follows close behind the Gospel read last Sunday. It is the last of three questions put to Jesus by Jewish religious leaders who are trying to trick him into saying something that might get him arrested. This reminds us that the context for today's reading is the mounting tension between Jesus and the religious leaders in Jerusalem.

The Herodians and the Pharisees asked the first question, which was about taxes. The Sadducees asked the second question, which was about the Resurrection (see Matthew 22:22-33). The third question, considered in today's Gospel, is asked by a Pharisee who asks Jesus about the greatest of the commandments.

The question requires Jesus to interpret the Law of Moses. The Mosaic Law consists of the Ten Commandments and many additional rules, numbering over six hundred. Adherence to the Mosaic Law, for a devout Jew, is an expression of faithfulness to God's covenant with Israel. The ranking of the Commandments was regularly debated among the teachers of the Law.

Jesus answers the Pharisees' question with a two-fold summary. Jesus says that all of the commandments can be summarized in two commandments: love God and love your neighbour. Both of these were central elements of the religious tradition Jesus learned from his Jewish community. Indeed these continue to be central aspects of contemporary Jewish religious understanding. Jesus' response to his questioners proposed an integral connection between these two aspects of the Jewish Law. Love of God finds its expression in our love for our neighbour.





At these Mass you will be invited to light a candle before the altar for those you wish to pray.

On the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed the Church gathers in solemn suffrage for the souls in purgatory, and the liturgy should express this clearly. The faithful who visit a church or cemetery to pray for the faithful departed, saying the Lord's Prayer and the Creed, may gain a plenary indulgence once only under the usual conditions: sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion and Prayer for the Pope's intentions.

Through prayer, this indulgence may be given over to the Holy Souls.

This feast day is a Solemnity (it is no longer a Holy Day of Obligation) and celebrated on 1 November. It is also the day that St Vincent de Paul church Redfern was consecrated by Archbishop Fisher in 2015. On this day there will be the following Mass times: Rosebery 7.30am, Redfern 6.30pm

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread – and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his

Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?' Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

ALL HALLOWS EVE

Commonly celebrated as an evening of ghosts and ghouls, scary looking costumes and trick or treating but what are we celebrating? All things Dark? As Christians we have a choice, we can either celebrate this night as a night of darkness or stand with Jesus as the light of the world, and celebrate October 31st as All Hallows Eve, as a night of light.

Place a lamp or light in your window if you stand for Christ and he is the Light of the World. All Hallows eve can be part of a special three-day holy celebration; October 31st All Hallows Eve, November 1st All Saints Day, November 2nd All Souls Day, in which we can contemplate, pray, attend Mass and create new and meaningful catholic traditions in our parishes and families.

We can honour God by Worshipping Jesus as the light of the World, by recognising his light in the lives of the Saints who reflected him to all of those around them, and by acknowledging and praying for all souls who have died in the faith, that they may receive his mercy, be reunited into his loving arms and live eternally in his light.
